We are primarily an RC club, but exposure to simple Free Flight models might appeal to some of you.

All that is required is a sleeved, balsa, RTF rubber-powered model airplane. Record your best flight time and mail in your results! Pretty simple, and pretty fun.

Now for a bit of ARF history. These days, the Guillows models are mostly what we have available for this type of contest. However, In the 50's, 60's, and 70's there were MANY model companies churning out these ready-to-fly designs that had good performance, but Guillows wasn't really one of them. It is still a mystery to me how the Guillows models survived through them all! Sometimes they fly fine, but sometimes not.

One company that's been lost to time is North Pacific Products of Bend, Oregon. Their designs were a marvel of simplicity and quality, and their fantastic performance often put the models on rooftops or in trees.

I'm showing my age now, but how many of us old guys teethed on these models?? I certainly did, and by scrounging up a couple of discarded soda bottles, enough money was generated to buy a rubber powered Sleek Streek or Star Flyer.

SOARING INTO THE SKIES: FF POSTAL CONTEST TAKES FLIGHT





Colin's CL Shop

Fellow CL'er Nat Seavy gave me this somewhat beat up Top Flite Nobler ARF model. I decided to take a stab and try to fix it and see if I could get it in the air. The original Nobler model dates back to the 1950's and is still kitted today. It has a 50" wingspan and will be powered by an OS 40LA engine. The model also has operable flaps.

This is a pic on how I received the model. It does not look too bad in the pic, but is did have a few issues and minor damage making it not airworthy.



First up was to fix the tail area. Probably the result of a crash, the tail and rudder were cracked. But nothing a little glue could not fix. Also had to get the stab/elev straight and level. Then add Ultracoat covering patches.



These Nobler ARF's were, as usual, made in China. The design and quality of the hardwood engine mounts were known to be poor and resulting in some unnecessary model vibration. So I added two 1/8" plywood stiffening gussets using high strength epoxy in an attempt to make the mounts more rigid. May not help, but surely won't hurt.





• New 4 oz Sulivan clunk fuel tank and new fuel tubing. The model originally had a 6 oz clunk tank that was not put together very well.

- Ultracoat covering repairs on the wing
 Re-glued a few loose flap and elevator hinges
- Fix loose tail wheel
- New lighter landing gear wheelsNew flap and elevator hinge line sealing tape
- Its now done and ready to maiden soon. Hopefully it will fly reasonably well. I also have a new Nobler ARF kit that I will assemble in the future. Hopefully the lessons learned from the repaired model will

pay dividends on my future Nobler ARF build such that I end up with a great flying stunt model.

This was my first RC plane, back when I was 14 which would make this around 1976. It was a 100" built up wing and tail, with some sort of plastic body. I flew it with my awesome Kraft 3 channel setup using a brick, which was a receiver and a pair of servos in one tiny 4"x1.5"x1.5"-ish unit.





We made a hi-start from about 100' of bungie and 300' of fishing line. I planted a stake in the ground to attach one end, and then walked downwind with a fish scale until I had about 10lbs pull and I put another stake to hold the line whilst I prepared.

I also had a nice carrying case for it to keep it all intact during transport.





I lived in Daly city until I was 14 and I remember flying my control line Cox PT-19 with my dad at a school down there when I was 10 or so. It wasn't until my mom gave me this photo album for a recent birthday that I realized I still had the might Cox after we had moved up here to Kenwood. Meeting called to order with 15 club members present and no guests.

Good News on the FAA Front. Our flying field is now FRIA certified. Which means we won't have to install ID Modules in our aircraft when flying at the club field. And if you haven't already done so, please go to the FAA web site and register for your FAA registration number. It only costs \$5.00 for three years. The club bought a label maker and is stored in the shed at the field. You can print out your reg. number and place the label on you model. It can be small and attached under the stab.

There is a new pilot's station on the flight line, ready for use.

Jim Wolfe is maintaining the First Aid boxes that are mounted on the shed. The large box is for major injuries, lots of blood and the small box is for minor cuts. There is another box in the shed with additional supplies. Stay safe, keep appendages out of the propellor.

Santa Rosa JC has cut down and removed the blackberry bushes on the west side of the field. We now have a great view of their vineyards.

Treasury report: The club now has 70 members and we can still pay our bills.

The WCF board is hoping to meet with the folks that would like to have a car track at our field. A survey was taken at the meeting and would appear they would be welcome to join us. Many details still have to be worked out with them.

Plans are going ahead with the WCF Swap meet on Sunday April 28. One new wrinkle is a plan to fly indoor models at the site after the swap meet is over.

The Ya-Ka-Ama board of directors has all new members. I have asked Betty Molina, their secretary for a schedule of events they are planning for 2024. We would like to plan our club events so they don't interfere with theirs.

There is a slightly different procedure to follow if a model goes down in the SRJC vineyard. There is quite a bit of activity in the vineyard, so ask permission from them to retrieve your model. You may get permission to go in the vineyard by yourself or may be escorted. Please don't go in the vineyard without permission. The SRJC has asked us to pick up all damaged parts of the model. Leave nothing behind. They are now a certified organic grower and could lose their status if debris if left behind. Do your best to fly within our boundary.

Show and Tell:

Mke Retterer showed his "Half Bad" EPP flying wing sloper. He said it flies very well and darn near indestructible.

John Cole brought his partially built 1/4 scale deHavilland Tiger Moth. The outlines are very true to scale. He plans to use a Saito 1.80 4-stroke for power. The picture does not do it justice. The kit was produced by Value Planes.
